- 2. Help implement GMRS (General Mobile Radio Service) backup communication
- 3. Expand our work to identify egress problems and evacuation routes
- 4. Keep supporting neighborhoods in taking on road clearing projects
- 5. Pursue grants to help us reach out to more people and create better egress

PG&E's installed 29 weather stations in the last two years, including one within our council boundaries at Horizon Drive and Horizon Court on the south end of Oak Hill Road. We show you how to access those weather stations on the website.

# When cell service (and internet and phones) go down, radio to the rescue!

During PG&E's outages this year, many of us found ourselves not only without internet or cell service, we couldn't even use our plain old landlines, which used to be the last thing to go out in a power outage. Not anymore. Imagine what would happen if there were a fire and the only way you could get notification was door-to-door. (That didn't work well in the Camp Fire.)



At the April 14th community meeting, Alan Thompson and the El Dorado County Amateur Radio Club will tell us about GMRS aka "Radio for the Rest of Us." They have been working hard in our county to establish a network of inexpensive, easy-to-use handheld radios that can be used for communication during an emergency.

Learn how you can be one of the first to get GMRS so you can communicate in an emergency even if cell towers, the internet, and landlines are down.
